## Guidelines for Writing a Critique

- Begin with an introduction. The introduction familiarizes readers with the essay under discussion, provide a context for the writing and state a clear thesis.
- Summarize main points. The summary tells readers what major points the student made in the essay on the novel to support his or her position.
- Analyze how well the writer has achieved his or her purpose. The analysis tells readers what aspects of the work you have examined, depending on the assignment that was to be followed. In general assess the overall presentation of evidence, judging its validity, accuracy, significance, and fairness.
- Explain your response to the writing. The response tells readers your personal viewpoint by explaining the extent to which you agree or disagree with the writer of the essay. Remember you read the book too, and you should be able explain your position.
- Conclude with <u>your</u> observations of the overall effectiveness of the writing and your personal views on the subject they chose to write about. The conclusion summarizes the results of your analysis and your overall judgment of the essay.
